

We support orphans, children deprived of parental care, and other groups of children who require specialized social assistance. Our approach goes beyond one-time assistance. We create systemic solutions that protect children's rights and strengthen the capacity of families and communities.

The Foundation implements comprehensive programs in four key areas: orphanhood prevention, development of family-based care and foster care (patronat), work with teenagers and young people, and deinstitutionalization.

We provide integrated psychological, social, educational, and legal support, working with children, families, specialists, and communities in partnership with state and international institutions. This approach allows us not only to react to crises, but also to prevent their long-term consequences.

Over the years, Ridni has become a professional support community for children, families, and those who work alongside them every day.

01 / DEAR PARTNERS AND FRIENDS OF RIDNI FOUNDATION!

The year 2025 became a year of important decisions, internal maturity, and our continuous support for children and families who needed it most. In the context of war, support for many families is not a one-time gesture, but a long-term journey that helps them to stay resilient, preserve family unity, restore inner strength, and return to children a sense of safety and the joy of childhood.

This year, we focused on work that is not always visible or popular but is critically important: supporting families who have taken responsibility of raising children - foster families, guardians, and adoptive families. We also worked systematically with families in crisis. Our task was not to "put out fires," but to restore families' capacity to care for their children and remain together.

A special focus in 2025 was support for teenagers and youth who grew up without proper parental care or who are transitioning into independent life during wartime. We supported them in accessing education, developing independent living skills, strengthening psychological resilience, and building confidence in their own abilities. For these young people, our support means not being left alone with the difficult decisions of adult life.

We clearly understand that no organization can create sustainable change on its own. Therefore, one of the Foundation's key priorities has been to unite all stakeholders around the child and the family - communities, local authorities, social services, professionals, educational institutions, international



partners, and civil society organizations. This coordination allows us to avoid duplication of efforts, strengthen one another, and build sustainable solutions that outlast individual projects.

I would like to express my sincere appreciation to the Foundation's team. These are people with open hearts who work daily with complex human stories, carry a high emotional load, and make difficult decisions. It is their commitment and professionalism that bring light where it is needed most.

We are deeply grateful to our partners and donors in Ukraine and around the world - individuals and organizations who care about the future of Ukrainian children and young people. Your trust, solidarity, and consistent support enable us to continue and expand our programs even in the most challenging circumstances.

I would also like to express our profound gratitude to the Armed Forces of Ukraine. Thanks to your courage and sacrifice, we can work, support families, and help build a future for children and young people in Ukraine.

Behind every figure in this report are real stories of children, young people, and families, as well as a network of people and partners united by a shared responsibility. Russia's full-scale war against Ukraine continues to have profound and long-term consequences for children's development and future. A significant share of educational infrastructure has been damaged or destroyed, and about **4.6 million children face barriers to accessing education**. Ongoing attacks and frequent air raid alerts disrupt the learning process, while in frontline regions many schools remain closed due to security risks or the lack of shelters. **As a result, nearly one million children are forced to study online, often in conditions of limited resources.**

→ WHY SUPPORT
IS CRITICAL RIGHT NOW

According to Save the Children, prolonged instability and stress increase children's exposure to disrupted learning, psychological trauma, and the loss of a sense of safety. These challenges have long-term effects on emotional development, socialization, and children's ability to build their own futures.

In this context, support for children and families requires a systematic and responsible approach, focused on ensuring safety, access to services, and a family environment for every child.





03 / THE CHILD AT THE CENTER OF ALL PROGRAMS AND ACTIVITIES

All programs are designed around a child-centered approach and aimed at preserving or restoring a family environment.

The Foundation works with the child not in isolation, but in the context of the family, community, and support system.



IN 2025, THE FOUNDATION'S WORK WAS STRUCTURED AROUND FOUR INTERCONNECTED PROGRAMS THAT CORRESPOND TO DIFFERENT STAGES OF A CHILD'S LIFE AND KEY SYSTEMIC CHALLENGES WITHIN THE CHILD PROTECTION SYSTEM →

PREVENTION

Preserving the child's biological family, developing parental potential, and reinforcing the institution of the family. We work to prevent social orphanhood and violations of children's rights by developing preventive services in communities, capacity building for parents and professionals, and implementing mechanisms for early identification, prevention, and mitigation of social risks.

FAMILY-BASED CARE AND FOSTER CARE (PATRONAT)

Ensuring the best interests of the child through placement in family-based care or foster care. We develop and support family-based care and patronat, strengthen state and community services, provide counseling to candidates, and accompany families throughout the adoption and placement process.

Promoting reform of the childcare system by transitioning from institutional care to family-based models, ensuring that every child receives care and support in a family environment.

↓ THE CHALLENGE

War and socio-economic instability increase the number of families in crisis, raising the risk of children losing a family environment.

↓ WHO WE SUPPORT

Families with children facing difficult life circumstances, as well as community-based professionals who work with them.

↓ HOW WE WORK

The program is implemented in cooperation with communities and local services. It focuses on early identification of needs, individualized family support, and strengthening the capacity of professionals working with children. This approach allows us not only to respond to crises, but also to prevent their escalation.

PROJECT: "STRENGTHENING CIVIL SOCIETY FOR RAPID RECOVERY AND WELL-BEING OF CHILDREN IN UKRAINE" IMPLEMENTED WITH THE SUPPORT OF WORLD VISION INTERNATIONAL

In partnership with World Vision International, Ridni Foundation implemented a project aimed at providing psychological support to children and families affected by the war in Ukraine. We joined forces to equip professionals – teachers, psychologists, and social workers – with new tools, while helping vulnerable groups, including internally displaced persons and families in crisis, restore resilience and a sense of stability.

- **249 specialists from 21 regions** participated in the "Points of Support" conferences;
- **85 specialists** mastered the "Khvylyalka" methodology;
- **4,877 children** participated in psychoeducational workshops across 18 regions;
- **30 participants** completed an online workshop on creating therapeutic fairy tales;
- **The "Helpers' Tales"** collection was created and distributed to **123 institutions and organizations**;
- A strategic session and project management training were conducted (KMBS).

STRENGTHENING THE SUPPORT SYSTEM



- **25 specialists** engaged to provide psychosocial support;
- **5 supervision sessions** conducted for specialists in Lviv region;
- **49 specialists** completed training using the "Batkivskyi Oberih" ("Parental Shield") methodology.

EARLY IDENTIFICATION AND RESPONSE



- **3,630 individuals** received psychosocial support (individual and group sessions with psychologists);
- **450 individual psychotherapy sessions** conducted;
- **133 children** received corrective services;
- **A study "Assessing the Needs of Children in Family-Based Care"** conducted (102 families, 249 children, 8 communities). The findings formed the basis for individualized solutions to protect each child's rights.

SUPPORTING AND STRENGTHENING PARENTAL CAPACITY



- **37 parent clubs** in 8 communities;
- **5 supervision meetings** held for parents.

PREVENTION OF DETERIORATION IN FAMILY LIVING CONDITIONS



- **22 families** provided with essential household appliances;
- **22 families** are currently in the process of receiving furniture.




- > Communities enhanced their capacity for early family needs identification and crisis response.

Children deprived of parental care often end up in institutional settings. Families on the path to adoption require professional support and guidance.

Children deprived of parental care, prospective adoptive parents, foster families, and patronat caregivers.

We provide psychological, legal, and social support, conduct training and support groups, develop patronat care, and cooperate with communities and child protection services.

PARTNERSHIP WITH UNICEF

In 2025, Ridni Foundation continued its strategic cooperation with UNICEF to ensure every child's right to grow up in a family environment. As part of this partnership, the hotline continued its work on adoption, family-based care, patronat, and mentorship.

The project is implemented in Lviv Region by Ridni Foundation and UNICEF with the financial support of the Government of the United States of America (USA).

The implementation of the program in 2025 became possible thanks to cooperation with international partners, government institutions, communities, as well as the active support of businesses, private donors, and philanthropists who share the value of family-based care for every child.

THE POWER OF SUPPORT: THE STORY OF OLYA AND VITALIY'S FAMILY

The heroes of the third season of the podcast "Finally We Met", implemented by Ridni Foundation together with UNICEF, shared their personal stories. This story is a testament to how the Foundation's support helps families overcome crises.



"We were the only support for each other, but it turned out not to be enough. The help of the psychologists from Ridni Foundation literally pulled us out of crisis."



Olya and Vitaliy went through a difficult period of adaptation after adopting their daughter Nastia, when it became clear that the family could not cope without professional help.

The Foundation provided the family with comprehensive psychological support, which helped the parents and their daughter better understand one another, overcome tension, and preserve their relationship.

CONSULTATIONS AND FAMILY SUPPORT



- **750+** legal and psychological *consultations* provided;
- **19 court decisions** supporting adoption processes;
- **31 children** placed in family-based care;
- **43 individuals** received psychosocial support;
- **328 calls to the hotline** regarding adoption, family-based care, foster care, and mentorship.

TRAINING AND SUPPORT FOR FAMILY-BASED CARE



- **225 participants** completed training for prospective adoptive parents and family-based caregivers;
- **47 participants** took part in support groups for family-based caregivers;
- **170 people** completed advanced training for existing family-based caregivers;
- **45 foster parents and children** in temporary care attended a three-day training retreat.

MATERIAL SUPPORT FOR FAMILIES



- **26 children** living in family-type children's homes and foster families received essential appliances and furniture.

PROMOTION OF ADOPTION AND FAMILY-BASED CARE



- **313 people** attended the "Child. Dream. Family" Forum;
- **15 meetups** were attended by 301 participants;
- **7 new episodes** of the podcast "Finally We Met" were released;
- **Awareness campaign "Foster Care Month"**, August 2025, Lviv.

- > Strengthened implementation of children's right to grow up in a family environment by developing and supporting family-based care.

"CHILD.DREAM.FAMILY" FORUM



The event was held in cooperation with the Lviv Regional State Administration. The forum brought together 313 participants - experts, government officials, and representatives of the civil society - around the topic of family-based care. Participants discussed the strategy for ensuring every child's right to grow up in a family, supporting foster and patronat (foster) families, and issues of youth socialization.

A highlight of the event was the announcement of the "Child's Journey" - a user-friendly service map designed to ensure faster support for families within their communities.

"GIVING WINGS" FORUM




In partnership with the Children's Services Department of the Lviv City Council, the Foundation organized a forum dedicated to the development of patronat care as an alternative to institutional upbringing. Participants discussed the importance of patronat care and ways to respond to the real needs of children in institutions. The forum became a platform for open dialogue between professionals, communities, and potential patronat caregivers.

"FOSTER CARE MONTH"



Together with the Children's Service of the Lviv City Council, a large-scale awareness campaign aimed at promoting patronat care was conducted. The campaign provided community residents with clear and practical information about patronat care, helping to overcome prejudices, and increase interest in temporary family-based care options for children.

↓ THE CHALLENGE

Teenagers and young people from vulnerable groups often lack support on their way to adulthood, which increases the risks of social isolation, educational loss, and uncertainty about their future.

↓ WHO WE SUPPORT

Teenagers and youth aged 14-23 with experience of institutional care, children raised in family-based care, internally displaced youth, young people with disabilities, and those who find themselves in difficult life circumstances.

↓ HOW WE WORK

We provide psychosocial support, non-formal education, career guidance, mentoring, and the development of youth communities, creating a safe environment for socialization, skills development, and future planning.

"SPILNOTA" (COMMUNITY)


"Spilnota" is a support and development program for teenagers and young people aged 14-23 who need social guidance and new opportunities. Participants include orphans, children deprived of parental care, internally displaced youth, teenagers with institutional experience, young people raised in family-based care, and young people in difficult life circumstances.

The program provides a safe space for emotional and psychological support, where participants build trust and develop life skills. Through meetings, trainings, and outdoor activities, young people learn to better understand themselves, cope with challenges during wartime, and confidently plan their future. The program focuses on mental health, non-formal education, and career guidance.

In 2025, the program was implemented in five regions of Ukraine through several support formats:

- Transformation program Power4Girls (Ivano-Frankivsk, Zakarpattia, Kyiv, Kryvyi Rih, Lviv);
- Scholarships (Ivano-Frankivsk, Kryvyi Rih, Lviv);
- Mentorship (Zakarpattia, Lviv);
- Small Group Home "Spilnota-Ridni" (Lviv).

- > Strengthened self-confidence and ability to independently choose education, profession, and future path.
- > Reduced educational and social barriers for vulnerable young people through access to career guidance, mentoring, and educational support.
- > Improved psychological resilience and life skills through safe spaces, support from adults, and peer communities.

FOR COMMUNITIES ↓

- > Established sustainable models for supporting young people during the transition to adulthood, particularly through mentorship and intersectoral cooperation.
- > Increased engagement of professionals and partners in working with youth with experience of institutional care, youth with disabilities, and those in difficult life circumstances.
- > Laid the foundation for scaling youth support programs as part of the broader child protection system and human capital development.

SPILNOTAFEST



The third large-scale youth festival within the Spilnota project, supported by Ukraine Children's Action Project (UCAP) and in partnership with the NGO "3D - Let's Help the Children." This year's festival brought together more than 70 teenagers. Ridni Foundation supports young people in various ways: we help them choose a profession, provide educational support, and help them find reliable mentors.

07 / DEINSTITUTIONALIZATION

↓ IMPACT

The program aims to support the reform of the childcare system by transitioning from institutional care to family-based care, ensuring that every child grows up in a safe and nurturing family environment.

Ridni Foundation implements this program by strengthening family-based and patronat (foster) care, building the capacity of professionals, and supporting the transformation of residential institutions into centers for social support of children and families – as a temporary transitional solution within the implementation of the Better Care reform.

We believe that no institution can replace a family for a child. Therefore, our work focuses on fundamental systemic changes that ensure every child’s right to grow up in a safe and stable family environment.

SYSTEMIC CHANGES

→ Initiated the creation of a working group on the transformation of the children's shelter under the Children's Service of the Lviv Regional State Administration into the Municipal Institution of the Lviv Regional Council "Center for Social Support of Children and Families."

→ Developed the methodological guide "Reintegration of Children into Families: Practical Steps and Support on the Path to Return."

FOR CHILDREN ↓

> Strengthened the realization of the children's right to be raised in a family environment.

> Reduced the risk of repeated institutionalization and prolonged stays of children in institutional facilities.

FOR COMMUNITIES AND PROFESSIONALS ↓

> Increased the capacity of communities and child protection services to make decisions in the best interests of the child.

> Professionals gained practical tools, guidance, and interagency support for working with children and families.

FOR THE CHILD WELFARE SYSTEM ↓

> Launched the transformation of residential institutions into centers for social support of children and families.

> Laid the groundwork for the sustainable implementation of the Better Care reform at the regional level.

MUNICIPAL INSTITUTION "CENTER FOR SOCIAL SUPPORT OF CHILDREN AND FAMILIES 'RIDNI'" OF THE LVIV CITY COUNCIL

Supported by the UK Government, the project "Strengthening the Capacity of the Family Support Service Department of the 'Ridni' Center for Social Support of Children and Families" was successfully implemented.

The initiative is implemented by Ridni Foundation in close cooperation with the Children's Services Department of the Lviv City Council's Humanitarian Policy Directorate and the Municipal Institution "Center for Social Support of Children and Families 'Ridni'" of the Lviv City Council.

KEY PROJECT RESULTS ↓

The project resulted in the development of the methodological guide "Reintegration of Children into the Family: Practical Steps and Support on the Path to Return."

The guide summarizes five years of the Center's systemic experience, which made it possible to achieve a key result: over 60% of children within nine months received the status of a child deprived of parental care, and 26.8% of them have already been placed in family-based forms of care.

such a result became possible thanks to the introduction of innovative practices and methodologies that lead to real, positive changes in the lives of children.



MUNICIPAL INSTITUTION OF THE LVIV REGIONAL COUNCIL "CENTER FOR SOCIAL SUPPORT OF CHILDREN AND FAMILIES"

In 2025, the Foundation initiated the creation and joined the working group on the transformation of the children's shelter of the Children's Services Department of the Lviv Regional State Administration into the Municipal Institution of the Lviv Regional Council "Center for Social Support of Children and Families." This is an example of the practical implementation of the National Strategy to ensure the right of every child in Ukraine to be raised in a family environment.

The uniqueness of the Center lies in its comprehensiveness: in one place several important departments whose main goal is to help children return to their biological families or find new ones as quickly as possible, while providing families facing difficult life circumstances with the strength and resources needed to strengthen relationships and thrive.

Throughout 2025, the Ridni Foundation's team continued to grow and strengthen its capacity: 19 new employees joined the Foundation, and nearly 30 training programs and learning events were implemented to support team development.

> 20 active students from Ivan Franko National University of Lviv and the Ukrainian Catholic University were involved.



> 7 events were held with the participation of students, including workshops for teenagers from the "Spilnota-Ridni" Small Group Home and children at the Ridni Center for Social Support of Children and Families, participation in forums, and preparation of the Power4Girls project.

> One program participant was employed by the Foundation within a joint project with UNICEF, confirming the effectiveness of the ambassador model as a talent pipeline.

In 2026, Ridni Foundation will focus on expanding its activities and improving the quality of services in the field of child and family support. Our strategic focus is on systemic solutions, sustainable programs, and strengthening our presence in regions with the greatest needs.
